A long-time lake advocate, Jeff is a retired medical device engineer avid hunter, fisherman, woodworker, and grandpa. Jeff was


elected at our annual membership meeting & spaghetti dinner. See Jeff's comments on page 8.

PREVENT AIS FROM SPREADING INTO THE LAKE!

<u>Deer Lake Station is a free service</u> which provides help & self-service tools and hot water. It is located at the Deer Lake public access.

It is NOT just a matter of time...YOU CAN KEEP AIS (aquatic invasive species) from entering Deer Lake:

- *Clean- all debris from boat, motor, trailer & gear
- *Drain- water from boat, all tanks & containers. Remove drain plus and keep open. Personal watercraft users- briefly run powertrain to expel all water.
- *Dispose- all unwanted bait in trash, not the lake!
- *OR, thoroughly dry watercraft for 5 days before launching.

PIONEERS OF DEER LAKE: THE THORPE BROTHERS

Deer Lake and Moose Lake nearly come together twice, but never actually mingle their waters. The land between these narrow land bridges is "sort of" an island. It is crossed by County Road 19 and has two dusty byroads that are grandly named East and West Thorpe Avenues in addition to Pinehurst Trail that lead to homes on the north side of Deer Lake.

The white pine forests of Deer Lake were harvested in the late 19th century. Around 1918 the land of the island was acquired by the Thorpe Brothers Corporation. The Thorpes were established

developers who had built Grandview Lodge on Gull Lake near Brainard. In 1920 they submitted plat maps to the county, specifying about 200 lots on the island. The lots were typically 100 feet wide with varying depths, generally 250 to 350 feet. Roads were

platted as if a city was planned for the site.

A log cabin was constructed on the south side of the island. A handwritten note in the cabin says, "According to Old Timers – this section of cabin was built in 1918 as land office for Thorpe Bros. selling lots on Deer Lake. Builder was Gus Byne & Son. Gus was an Indian from Okla." The cabin still stands and has been incorporated into a larger guest cabin as a dining room.



In 1919 the Thorpes started Pinehurst Lodge on Deer Lake, finishing it in 1920. The dining room served guests, tourists and the local population. In 1929, Charles and Elsie Voight built a resort and store near Pinehurst.

In time, the unsold lots on Thorpe Island became tax forfeit and eventually were transferred to state ownership. There were intentions to develop the land for recreational uses, but only a swimming beach on Moose Lake was established. More recently, ownership has transferred to Itasca County and its land department has sold some of the lots to adjacent landowners, with the remainder assigned to the city of Deer River. A parcel of lots north of highway 19 and fronting on Moose Lake has been offered for many, many times the amount the Thorpe brothers paid for the island a century ago.

Help came! Two DNR biologists were contacted - who immobilized it with a spotlight, and then freed it. They returned the bird to its' nesting platform, where the loon would

likely be incubating eggs. Good going!

The DNR says there are about 12,000 common loons in Minnesota, which puts the state second to Alaska for total population. Loons have a lifespan of about 30 years!

August Recipe from Joyce Erickson



For our August Newsletter, I found it only fitting that I would submit my favorite summer dessert that my grandmother and mother made every summer during raspberry season. The name of the cake is Raspberry "Bublan", a Czech word which I was told translated to berry cake.

I did some research on the word Bublan and it turns out that Bublan or Bublanina translates to Bubble Cake, which is a soft and moist sponge Raspberry Bublan

3 eggs

3/4 C sugar

I C milk

4 Tbsp melted butter

1-3/4 C flour

3 tsp baking powder

I tsp salt (optional)

2 pints of fresh berries

cake, often made in the Czech Republic on Sundays to accompany afternoon coffee. Most often it is made with fruit of the season, mostly berries. And why is it called Bubble Cake you ask? When you bake it, bubbles form up around the fruit and therefore the name Bublan. I learn something new every single day.

Here's the recipe, now that your mouth must be watering, especially if you love raspberries like I do. Beat the eggs and add sugar and milk. Beat well. Add the flour, baking powder, salt to the egg mixture. Lastly, add melted butter. Mix well.

Pour into a lightly greased 3x9" cake pan. Distribute berries (well drained) over batter and sprinkle 1/2 cup sugar over the berries.

Bake at 375 degrees for about 30 minutes. If it is still a little juicy, bake just a few minutes longer.

You can serve this delicious sponge cake with ice cream if you wish. And you don't have to make it just on Sundays with your afternoon coffee. Enjoy it anytime you wish to have Bubble Cake.
