IF YOU LOVE AND APPRECIATE DEER LAKE, IT'S CONTINUED BEAUTY, CLARITY, WILD LIFE AND PRIVACY, YOUR THANKS SHOULD GO TO THE MEMBERS OF THE DEER LAKE ASSOCIATION.

Years ago, lake associations were unnessary. No one ever thought anything could happen to our lake. But times have changed. There are many things that can happen to our lake and surrounding land. Such as erosion, pollutants. (fertilizers, chemicals, improper disposal of hazardous household waste or chemicals, nutrients, pesticides, bacteria, oxygen demanding substances - to mention a few. All of these affect water quality, fish habitat and wildlife. It has become a necessity for us to protect our lake. It has also become a necessity for us to protect our shoreline if we are to continue enjoying all of our wildlife and their nesting areas.

What prompted the Deer Lake members to come together and become an association? In 1992, a group called Polaris, announced they were going to build a hundred bed hospital (in the Little Long Lake area) for teen age drug and alcohol rehabilitation. (Would you like to have a hospital like this across the road from you)? To make a long story short, a group of Deer Lake residents banded together and put up a fight. It was through our collective and convincing voice that the hospital was not built. It was then realize that there would be numerous other crisis affecting Deer Lake and we needed to form the present CLA.

We have faced other crisis. But we were organized and ready to do whatever was necessary to protect our lake, land and wildlife.

The DLA has a tax committee which works with other lake associations, the Minnesota Lake Association and the State Legislature in hopes of achieving a reevaluation of real-estate property assessment and an equalization of tax bases.

The DLA has a water committee which keeps track of Deer Lake. Some of their responsibilities include Sechi disk measurements, location of buoys and the over population of rockbass. Other concerns include control of jet-ski activity and slow or no wake zones for safety and wild! In protection. They are also involved in the fish stocking program.

The DLA has a land committee which is concerned with any activity that takes place on land neighboring Deer Lake. They are also compiling brochure which will advise prospective property owners of current regulations for septic tanks, land use, land cearing, shore maintenance and building set-back codes.

In 1992, there were a handful of Deer Lake residents who began to organize what is now the DLA. Currently, our membership exceeds 120.

This letter is being sent to those of you who do not belong. As times continue to change, all lake associations will require a stronger collective voice. It is our hope you will realize that we need each of you as members and you also need the DLA.
